ACFT & CWST

PURDUE ARMY ROTC BOILER BATTALION



From April 14–17, the Boiler Battalion conducted its semi-annual Army Combat Fitness Test (ACFT), with Cadets demonstrating their dedication to physical readiness and continuous improvement. Over the course of the four mornings, Cadets completed the six-event test with discipline and determination, resulting in an average score of 533 across the battalion. This achievement reflects the collective effort, resilience, and commitment of the Cadets, who have worked tirelessly to improve their performance and push one another towards excellence. In the coming semester we will be implementing the new AFT and wish a happy farewell to the standing ball throw.



On the morning of March 5th, the
Boiler Battalion conducted its semesterly
Combat Water Survival Test (CWST). Cadets

were instructed by their upper classmen on various water-based survival abilities before being given the chance to try them all out for themselves. These ranged from a confidence swim, a rifle swim, and an equipment drop, all while wearing their OCPs. This was all aimed at improving the confidence of Cadets when it comes to performing the abilities they may potentially need in their future while being in a safe controlled environment. As always, the battalion showed up eager and ready and ended the CWST with a pass rate of 97%



SPRING FTX

The path to our successful spring FTX was no easy one for our MS4s. Although they completed the MDMP in order to plan out a successful and beneficial joint training event for the other Cadets, there were numerous challengers that posed a risk to the FTX. Despite these changes the Boiler Battalion was able to successfully adapt to harsh weather and flooded training areas in order to execute crucial training.

Cadets began day 1 with land navigation and did this only with a compass, map, and a protractor. Teams of 2-3 were given 5 points and to pass the test Cadets were to find 3 of the 5 points. Cadets attempted to find and mark multiple grid points utilizing their teamwork, critical thinking and overall navigation skills at Martell Forest. This was made difficult due to vast terrain, far placed points, and points that varied between self-correcting and non-self-correcting.

Day 2 was the Situational Training Exercises (STX), and all Cadets performed 2 STX lanes to learn and understand the roles in an attack and ambush operation. Cadets were tested on their leadership, decision making and working under a tactical environment.


Day 3 the Cadets were brought to the armory to work on teamwork and leadership by understanding and presenting an OPORD and briefing the OPORD. Later, MS1 and MS2 Cadets went on a 6-mile Tactical Ruck March around Purdue's Campus with a 35lb ruck sack. Meanwhile, MS3 Cadets performed warrior tasks at the armory to further their understanding in various areas such as weapons systems, radios, and call for fire. In the end, The Boiler Battalion lived out the "fight to train" mantra by navigating the fast changing conditions to make sure that the Cadets got the proper training for their futures while demonstrating grit, perseverance and growth from this overall experience.

MG (Retired) Wright discussed key events and stories during his career that demonstrated his determination to serve. Throughout his speech there was a heavy emphasis on doing what is right and advocating for one's self and others despite the possible consequences. His talk helped provide examples and connected what Cadets learn about the Army values to the real world. Cadets also learned about readiness. During his time in the guard MG Wright conducted rescues with little prior notice. He had to be prepared, ready, and confident in his skills at any time. The rescues he discussed also required quick decision making and problem-solving skills. Cadets took away the importance of being familiar with one's capabilities and equipment because of the role it plays in making decisions. Overall, MG Wright's experiences helped Cadets bridge the concepts they've learned in the classroom to real-life scenarios.





LTG Jered P. Helwig spoke to the Boiler Battalion about his career and his journey in the Army. Prior to his current position, LTG Helwig served as the Commanding General of the 8th Theater Sustainment. Other highlights include Serving as the Director for Logistics and Engineering of United States Indo-Pacific Command, and Chief of Transportation and Commandant at the United States Army Transportation School. During his speech he talked about notable moments in his career, what his plans were for the Army at the time, and how they differed from what actually happened. He emphasized how even though one's path in the Army isn't always straightforward, if one trusts in one's self and the people around them, they can achieve your goals. He also stressed the adaptability. Cadets importance of learned information on what to expect in their futures and how to create a supportive environment that both helps them and the people around them achieve their goals.



CLUBS



TACTICS



Pathfinders Club, led by Cadet Reutebuch and Powerlifting Club led by Cadet Lonzo, provided Cadets with a well-rounded approach to fitness. The Pathfinders focus on high-intensity, CrossFit-style workouts, while the Powerlifting Club emphasizes structured weight training to build overall strength. Both these clubs met once a week to workout and build a community within the battalion. These clubs do a great job of preparing the Cadets for the AFT (formerly ACFT) as well as promoting overall physical readiness.

COLOR GUARD



Under the leadership of CDTs Schuette, Fortin, and Lucas, the Tactics Club met after lab to further develop tactical proficiency through additional training in M240 and M249 machine guns, warrior skills, STX lanes, and patrol base operations. This club is a prime example of the extra work that not only the upperclassmen, but also the underclassmen put in in order to further develop the skills and strategies needed to succeed not only in the ROTC but as Second Lieutenants in the Army.

POWERLIFTING and PATHFINDERS





LABS

During Lab 5, MS2 Cadets focused on learning how to properly emplace and employ a Claymore. Training included identifying the components of the Claymore, understanding its effective range and tactical applications, and practicing safe emplacement procedures in a controlled environment. This hands-on experience provided Cadets with a foundational understanding of how the Claymore supports defensive operations and enhances area security, while also reinforcing key concepts in terrain analysis, safety protocols, and small-unit tactics.





During Lab 9, MS1 Cadets applied the fundamentals, key components, and practical aspects of platoon defense. MS2 Cadets reviewed platoon formations and learned how to maneuver as a platoon to conduct a raid. Meanwhile, MS3 Cadets focused on applying individual patrolling fundamentals and components.

During Lab 11, the Boiler Battalion concentrated on M4 weapons familiarization and preliminary marksmanship training across all Cadet levels. MS1s were introduced to the M4 rifle, building foundational confidence in its operation and grouping techniques. MS2 Cadets focused on Preliminary Marksmanship Instruction (PMI) and further M4 familiarization to prepare for future Table VI transitions. Meanwhile, MS3 Cadets advanced their marksmanship proficiency and trained on the M4, M249, and M240 weapon systems in preparation for Table VI qualification and the weapons lanes at Cadet summer Training (CST).

BATAAN MEMORIAL MARCH

Additionally, they pushed themselves to complete the march, which is a fitting and symbolic way to honor the sacrifice of those who were a part of the Bataan Death March in 1942.

Once arriving in El Paso ahead of the memorial march, the Bataan team was met by Cadets Lynch, Cimino, and Tennent who had independently been training for the march as a group. As a collective group they had the unique opportunity to meet with service members of 4-70th AD and even had the chance to get hands on a M1 Abrams.

MILITARY APPRECIATION


PURDUE ARMY ROTC BOILER BATTALION
