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LETTER FROM THE BNCO

Naval ROTC is an institution dedicated to the success of its members as students, future armed forces officers, members of the community, and as individuals. No other organization at Purdue University can provide the support, comradery, and challenge that NROTC can. The unique opportunities this unit provides, ranging from full tuition scholarships to student leadership positions, are unrivaled. Midshipmen grow morally, mentally, and physically throughout their four years, learning from other midshipmen and staff, taking on greater and greater responsibilities.

The Fall 2018 and Spring 2019 semesters are no exception to this. This year our unit has welcomed 39 new Midshipmen to the program and a say a friendly "See you in the fleet" to 12 new Ensigns and 2nd Lieutenants in December, and another 13 this May. Most of these new Midshipmen are freshmen who entered this program through an immaculately run orientation process run by MIDN 1/C Anderson and 1/C Alerding. Over the span of a few days, the new Midshipmen were welcomed into the program and familiarized with both ROTC and the University. The result of this outstanding new student orientation was a class of new students fully prepared to meet the rigors of the NROTC program and Purdue academics with ease.

Midshipmen enter the battalion either already on scholarship or in pursuit of one. With great pride, I can report that over a dozen Midshipmen had three- or four-year scholarships activated. It is to no surprise that we had a large amount of scholarships awarded. Every member of the battalion works hard and the approximately 2,000+ volunteer hours conducted in a single year is only one piece of proof to such dedication to excel.

In the Fall of 2018, we celebrated the 243rd birthdays of the Navy and Marine Corps. In a combined ceremony, planned by MIDN 2/C Lushinski, both services were greatly honored. Thanks to MIDN Lushinski and her team of hard-workers, the ball was held at the Purdue Memorial Union; a historical center for the university itself. The ball was stupendous, worthy of celebrating the great legacy of each service.

The Fall semester also saw another victory for the NROTC battalion in the tri-service competition known as Commander's Cup. This competition includes many competitions where Midshipmen demonstrated their dominance over the Army and Air Force. With this year's victory secured, no Midshipmen currently in the unit has ever known what it is like to lose to our sister units at Purdue.

Many other events occurred this past year. Leadership conferences were attended at Notre Dame, University of Michigan, and in our nation's capital. Select Midshipmen took these opportunities to enhance their knowledge, bringing back their lessons learnt to share with the entire battalion. A team of Midshipmen, led by MIDN 2/C Conlisk, formed together to compete in the Notre Dame Flyin' Irish



Basketball Tournament this spring. This tournament is an extremely competitive event, pitting the skills and teamwork of many ROTC units against each other for the title of champion. But basketball isn't the only sport our Midshipmen competed in. An intramural softball team, affectionately called the Scallywags, led by MIDN 2/C Cleary, has geared up for yet another intense round of matches.

The Spring of 2019 also saw the 2nd annual Semper 5K. This charitable event, led by MIDN 3/C Reilly, is aimed at raising funds for Summit Soldiers; a charity whose mission is to support our veterans. With a team by his side, MIDN Reilly, designed and executed this enormous responsibility to great success and enthusiasm. There is no doubt, that the work done by the 5K committee has benefited the community.

Us seniors cannot forget our chance to attend Dining In. As with Birthday Ball, this is a timehonored tradition for 1/C Midshipmen to attend, celebrate accomplishments, and cherish four years of memories. This event was grand, and the planning of it by MIDN 1/C Papai, Martin, and Anderson was no small task.

Lastly, but certainly not least, is the reintroduction of the NROTC Drill Team. Led by the officer in charge, MIDN 3/C Liberto, with the assistance of our AMOI, GySgt. Calkins, the concept of having a drill team has been realized once again. Consisting of several dozen Midshipmen, the team has practiced week after week in order to prepare for the first ever Military Excellence Competition the unit has competed in in many years.

Individually, all the are incredible accomplishments. Together, they signify a year of unmatched hard work, spirit, and growth. Much more could be said, including discussing the introduction of joint physical training, 1/C led leadership lessons, Marine field training exercises, and the excellent mentorship program, but a year as great as this cannot be summarized in a mere couple pages. Leading the Navy and Marine Corps Midshipmen of the NROTC battalion has been an honor, and a privilege. COTRAMID WEST 2018

CORTRAMID, Career Orientation and Training for Midshipmen, is a summer program designed to show rising 3/C Midshipmen the different career paths possible in the Navy and Marine Corps. While this is the largest and most defined goal in the CORTRAMID mission statement, there is the more important side goal of giving ROTC midshipman across the country connections to each other that will span out into the fleet. Schools from coast to coast send ROTC midshipmen to CORTRAMID and all these midshipmen make friendships forged in toil and fun that will last well into their professional lives and learn invaluable lessons that will start them on the greatest path of self-discovery of their lives. CORTRAMID West takes place primarily in Naval Base San Diego and all its attached facilities including MCAS Miramar, NB Point Loma, NAS North Island, and MCB Camp Pendleton. Midshipman are moved through these areas in waves, experiencing the best the Navy and Marine Corps have to offer. While going through the 4-week long training program midshipmen are exposed to every single possible community they could be commissioned to upon graduation from ROTC. Midshipman experience underway time aboard a surface ship and submarine, flight time in various training aircraft, as well as quality bonding time in the barracks and on the firing ranges of Camp Pendleton. Midshipmen are also exposed to the SEAL and EOD communities through quality group interaction with active service members. 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OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL

Officer Candidate School is the pinnacle moment of our Marine Option careers here in NROTC. All rising Marine option seniors (1/C), go to Officer Candidate School in Quantico, VA during the summer in one of the two six-week sessions. At Officer Candidate School all candidates are screened and evaluated morally, mentally, and physically in order to determine if they have what it takes to lead marines. My time at Officer Candidate School was challenging. Our unit here at Purdue prepared me extremely well for Officer Candidate School making me confident going into it. Needless the say you can only prepare so much until you reach the point of experiencing it first-hand. One of my sergeant instructors summed up Officer Candidate School very well, "OCS is not an easy task, its challenging and we make you be comfortable in uncomfortable situations... If you don't learn this there are more people who can and will". With that being said it is not impossible, and if you are motivated and have a goal in mind you will succeed. Officer Candidate School challenged me and shaped me into a better person individually and as a leader. At the end if you pass all the events and make it through you earn your Eagle Global and Anchor. FIELD TRAINING EXERCISE

One weekend out of each semester Mike Company conducts Field Training Exercise, hereon referred to as FTX. The overall purpose of the FTX is to prepare MIDN for Officer Candidate School (OCS), which takes place in the summer between their 2/C and 1/C years. FTX gives MIDN a chance to grow as leaders through practical application of various techniques and exercises that they will see at OCS onward. The two biggest concepts taught to MIDN are the concepts of Land Navigation and Small Unit Leadership Exercises (SULEs). While both the Fall and Spring FTX are structured in similar ways, they differ in important ways.

The Fall FTX is the first FTX for the incoming 4/C. They do not know what to expect, which makes the overall tone different from Spring FTX. Because the 4/C need to get up to speed, the Fall FTX is more about learning. The goal of the 4/C is to be a sponge and absorb as much information as possible. The 3/C are typically squad leaders and are tasked with helping the 4/C learn. The 2/C are given the higher billets such as Platoon Commander or Platoon Sergeant. The overall tone for Fall FTX for the 4/C is to learn, for 3/C and 2/C it is to teach

The Spring FTX differs from the Fall FTX in a couple of important ways. Concerning the 4/C, this is their second FTX. This means that they now have an idea of what to expect and what will be expected of them. Additionally, the Spring FTX is where Mike Company is integrated with PLC candidates and other ROTC schools. The PLC candidates are those who are going to go to OCS but are not enrolled in the NROTC program. In Spring FTX the 4/C are first introduced to some of the stress of OCS. This is introduced to them by OCS Sergeant Instructors who turn up the heat. They act in the same way to MIDN and candidates that they would at OCS. This includes lots of yelling, lots of MIDN and candidates sprinting, and lots of seemingly pointless, yet tiring, tasks to accomplish. The overall tone for all who go on Spring FTX is to stay engaged and endure.


FALL 2018 CHANGE OF COMMAND

OHIO STATE DRILL MEET

On Saturday, 6 April, Purdue NROTC went to Ohio State University to compete in their annual invitational drill competition. Overall Purdue participated in 8 events:

Platoon Drill: 20 4/C Midshipmen with a guide and unit leader executed a drill card to be scored and judged by a Master Chief Petty Officer. The trained for over 6 weeks leading up to the event and placed 4th overall.

Squad Drill: 6 Midshipmen with a unit leader executed a squad drill card to be scored and evaluated by a SSgt and Sgt in the Marine Corps. They trained for 3 weeks leading up to the event and finished 6th overall.

Ship Handling: 5 Midshipman were placed on the simulated bridge of an Arleigh-Burke class destroyer to conduct a series of trials that tested their cohesion, navigation, and watch standing knowledge. They also took a quiz on the rules of the road when sailing a destroyer. Had they not had an accidental collision with a tug boat, they would have finished 3rd overall, but were instead disqualified.

King of the Circle: One Midshipman was placed in an inflatable hamster ball and battle other Midshipmen in hamster balls to push them out of a circle. We finished 2nd overall in this event.

Basketball: A three Midshipman team took place in a double elimination basketball tournament. We finished 2^{nd} overall.

Shooting: A team of 4 Midshipman shot 3 different courses as stationary targets with a 22 pistol, then the top shooter was selected to attend another event where they had to perform a PT evolution then shoot. We finished 2^{nd} overall.

Color Guard: 5 Midshipman executed a color guard card to be scored and judge by a Master Chief Petty Officer. They were members of Purdue NROTC's regular color guard contingent, they placed 5th overall.

Endurance Challenge: A team of 4 Midshipman took part in a 13+ mile race with 14 stops along the way to conduct a physical fitness evolution, it was a grueling and challenging event, but our team overcame the odds and performed admirably. They finished 5th overall.


We finished 5th overall at the meet and had a very enjoyable time. We learned a lot and are excited to take this knowledge and improve upon in the future.
